

FIRST READING

Acts 2:1-11

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike - Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 12:3-7,12-13

No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord' unless he is under the influence of the Holy Spirit.

There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose.

Just as a human body, though it is made up of many parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink.

DON'T BUNDLE UP AGAINST THIS WIND

Boy, I love a cool breeze on a hot and humid day. But boy, I hate those biting winds that cut right through me in winter. That's the wind for you. Sometimes it refreshes you. Sometimes it shakes you up. Just like the Holy Spirit.

This week we celebrate Pentecost, the day when the first Apostles realised that God's Spirit was with them. The Gospel tells this story by recalling how Jesus gave his Apostles the Holy Spirit with a breath. Scripture scholars say that our ancestors described the Spirit of God as a breath or breeze because the wind was one of the most powerful and mysterious forces they witnessed. Just like God's Spirit, it could tear down or refresh, and they could never control it.

Although we can't control the Holy Spirit, we can still take advantage of its power. It can refresh us when fear, uncertainties, or broken relationships wear us out. It shakes us up when we've done something wrong. It can give us power to stand for justice by doing things like serving the poor, stopping gossip, and marching for peace. It can lead us on adventures.

Here's an example. Sarah is a friend of mine who never dreamed of working in ministry when she was at university. One day her former youth minister dragged her to a conference on youth ministry. She went reluctantly. But some things the speaker said stuck with her, and soon she felt something pushing her in a new direction. Though she resisted at first, she eventually gave in and now works as a parish youth minister, helping young people connect with the Spirit that led her

to them and has made her life so exciting.

How do you respond to this sacred wind? The Holy Spirit enters your life through prayer, the Scriptures, the sacraments and people who care for you. You can feel it's breeze when your conscience stirs, your dreams soar or your heart aches for someone in pain. Be willing to let the Spirit take you where God wants, as the Apostles did. Don't bundle up against it. Let it carry you on an adventure.

LAUNCH OF "FRIENDS OF FRANCIS"

Friends of Francis hopes to be a community of Catholics across the Fleurieu and Kangaroo Island region, who support each other to be actively involved in working for social justice, peace through nonviolence, and care for creation. Inspired by Pope Francis' witness and call to us to bring hope to the world in crisis, we will also be taking heart from the example of St Francis of Assisi, whose life has inspired so many to give their hearts in loving service to those in need.

We will be walking for about 15 minutes on soft sand, so reasonable fitness and mobility will be necessary. Wear suitable clothing for the weather, and good walking shoes. The walk will begin at 2.00pm and be completed by 2.45pm.

The gathering at Galilee Community Room will begin at 3.00pm and conclude by 4.30pm. If you cannot participate in the Scrub walk you will be very welcome to join in at the gathering.

EXPLORING THE WORD

Despite the promise of Jesus that he would not leave his disciples 'orphaned' (see Sixth Sunday of Easter), after his death, they huddle in fear in the upper room. He comes among them, not offering recriminations at their lack of faith. but offering peace – a peace won through the cross and resurrection. Just as Jesus is transformed by this experience, so too, the disciples' fear turns to joy. In the giving of his Spirit, Jesus literally breathes life back into the disciples. They are to go out and continue his work of forgiveness, judgement and witness in the world.

DID YOU KNOW?

Pentecost was originally a Jewish harvest festival which was celebrated fifty days after the Passover. It was one of the great 'pilgrimage' festivals which meant that people came to celebrate this feast at the Temple. It was for this festival that so many pilgrims were present in Jerusalem on the day when the Spirit was manifested in the lives of the disciples.
