FIRST READING

Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11

'Console my people, console them' says your God.

'Speak to the heart of Jerusalem and call to her that her time of service is ended, that her sin is atoned for, that she has received from the hand of the Lord double punishment for her crimes.'

POPE FRANCIS' NEW YEAR MESSAGE - "GOOD POLITICS AT THE SERVICE OF PEACE"

His annual blessing of peace to the whole world focuses on the importance of political life in the creation of a human community in which the rights of all are respected. He sees politics as essen-tial to the human vocation to help build the "universal city of God" in which God's desires for the well-being of the human family come to fruition.

Yet, as we are all too well aware, the abuse of politics for personal gain is all too rife, resulting in the "oppression, marginalization and even destruction" of many people. Some of the signs of this are corruption, xenophobia, racism, disre-gard for the environment, the plundering of natural resources and contempt for refugees.

To counter these vices of politics we need to practice a "politics of peace", in which respect for all, especially the most vulnerable and the young, build a world of trust and confidence.

As we celebrate the 70th anniversary of the declaration of Universal Human Rights, and the 100th anniversary of the end of World War 1, let us commit ourselves to the three-fold conversion to which the Gospel calls us – peace with oneself, peace with each other, and peace with creation.

And as we begin this year with a Federal election looming, and with the poisoning of political life all too evident both here and elsewhere, I look forward to the chance to have conversations in our Catholic communities about how we can help to create "good politics at the service of peace."

DID YOU KNOW?

mass

- This feast and the wedding at Cana miracle (next week's gospel) were originally celebrated on the same day as the feast of the Epiphany because they are also considered to be manifestations of the Christ.
- The word baptism comes from a Greek word meaning 'to plunge'
- The first Christians were baptised by being plunged into running streams or rivers, following the

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practice of John. Later, large fonts were built in churches, and baptism of the faithful, usually adults, was by full immersion.

- The mainstream Christian churches—Catholic, Orthodox, Protestant and Anglicanrecognise the same baptism. If a person is baptised into one of these churches, it is not repeated, even if they move to worshiping in another church.
- Jesus is clearly attracted by the preaching of the Baptist and submits to his baptism of repentance. Scholars believe that Jesus may have spent some time as a disciple of John the Baptist before embarking on his own public ministry.

SHARING THE TRADITION

Baptism is the first of the seven sacraments of the church. A sacrament is a sign through which God communicates love, life and forgiveness to us: 'Immersion in water symbolises not only death and purification, but also regeneration

and renewal. Thus the two principal effects (of baptism) are purification from sins and new birth in the Holy Spirit'

EXPLORING THE WORD

A small text later in the Gospel of Luke offers us a key to today's gospel. During his public ministry, Jesus says, 'Up to the time of John it was the Law and the Prophets; since then the Kingdom of God has been preached' (Luke 16:16). The baptism of Jesus marks the turning point. Today's gospel tells the story of crossing the threshold from the old order into the new. John very clearly states that despite some people's expectations, he is not the Messiah—the usher of the new order. John points beyond his own time to a future when God's Spirit is given at baptism, and the first of such baptisms belongs to Jesus himself. Immediately after Jesus' somewhat anonymous immersion along with 'all the people', the Spirit does indeed come to Jesus and the affirming voice from heaven announces Christ's sonship. God has come among us indeed.



compassion that he saved us, by means of the cleansing water of rebirth and by renewing us with the Holy Spirit which he has so generously poured over us through Jesus Christ our saviour. He did this so that we should be justified by his grace, to become heirs looking forward to inheriting eternal life.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION Lk 3:16

Alleluia, alleluia!
John said: He who is to come is
mightier than I; he will baptise you
with the Holy Spirit and with fire.
Alleluia!

GOSPEL

Luke 3:15-16, 21-22

A feeling of expectancy had grown among the people, who were beginning to think that John might be the Christ, so John declared before them all, 'I baptise you with water, but someone is coming, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to undo the strap of his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. Now when all the people had been baptised and while Jesus after his own baptism was at prayer, heaven opened and the Holy Spirit descended on him in bodily shape, like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you.'

GOSPEL BACKGROUND

Today we celebrate the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. In today's Gospel, as in the other Gospel accounts of Jesus' baptism, we hear John the Baptist address the confusion of the people who thought that John might be the Messiah. In response, John contrasts the baptism that he performs with the Baptism that Jesus will inaugurate. John the Baptist says that he has baptized with water, but that someone will come and baptize with the Holy Spirit. The type of baptism that John performed was not yet a Christian Baptism; it was a preparation for Christian Baptism through which sins are forgiven and the gift of the Holy Spirit is received.

The baptism of Jesus is reported in each of the three Synoptic Gospels—

Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Clearly, it was an event of great significance for Jesus and for the early Christian community. The Evangelists Mark and Luke report the story from Jesus' perspective; the voice from heaven is addressed to Jesus. Compare this to Matthew's Gospel in which the voice from heaven speaks to everyone. In Luke, however, the Holy Spirit descends upon Jesus during his time of prayer after his baptism. Through his Gospel, Luke will show Jesus to be a person of prayer who withdraws regularly from the crowds and his disciples to pray to his Father.

The baptism of Jesus is considered a manifestation of God in Jesus. another "epiphany." On this, the last day of the Christmas season, our Gospel reveals to us Jesus' relation to God: the son of Mary and Joseph is also God's own Son. In Luke's Gospel, all three members of the Trinity are manifested here: God the Father in the voice, the Holy Spirit descending, and Jesus the Son. At the beginning of his Gospel, Luke is communicating to us important information about the identity of Jesus. In the verses that follow, Luke lists the genealogy of Jesus, tracing Jesus' ancestry back to the first person, Adam, who is also identified as the son of God. We, the children of Adam and Eve, are again made children of God through Baptism.
