FIRST READING

Acts 6:1-7

About this time, when the number of disciples was increasing, the Hellenists made a complaint against the Hebrews: in the daily distribution their own widows were being overlooked. So the Twelve called a full meeting of the disciples and addressed them, 'It would not be right for us to neglect the word of God so as to give out food; you, brothers, must select from among yourselves seven men of good reputation, filled with the Spirit and with wisdom; we will hand over this duty to them, and continue to devote ourselves to prayer and to the service of the word.' The whole assembly approved of this proposal and elected Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit, together with Philip, Prochorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicolaus of Antioch, a convert to Judaism. They presented these to the apostles, who prayed and laid their hands on them.

The word of the Lord continued to spread: the number of disciples in Jerusalem was greatly increased, and a large group of priests made their submission to the faith.



but for unbelievers, the stone rejected by the builders has proved to be the keystone, a stone to stumble over, a rock to bring men down. They stumble over it because they do not believe in the word; it was the fate in store for them.

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a consecrated nation, a people set apart to sing the praises of God who called you out of the darkness into his wonderful light.

GALILEE IS 10 YEARS OLD!

Galilee Catholic Learning Community, established in 2007, is the third Catholic School to be built in the Willunga/Aldinga area. The first, mentioned in the press in July 1867, was Catholic girls' school with a third

class licence in Willunga. There is now no memory of its location. In 1868, the new Director General of Catholic Education, Fr Tennison-Woods, opened St Joseph's Schoolroom in Willunga, with the Sisters of Saint Joseph in charge of 40 children.

Many older parishioners remember recurring conversations amongst parishioners about re-establishing a Catholic School in the area. These discussions had probably been ongoing dialogue since the closure of St Joseph's School in Willunga in 1882.

Many years before 2007, the Parish seriously explored possibilities for a new school in Willunga. However, when forecasts of population increase in the area became apparent, Aldinga became the obvious location and a school at the site of the old Galilee church on Quinliven Road was mooted. Many present Parishioners remember spending hours at the Aldinga shopping centre collecting public registrations of interest in enrolment at a school that was going to be built at that site. A public meeting, which outlined the plans for the school and answered queries from the public, both positive and negative, was held in the Church.

It soon became apparent that the site on Quinliven Road was too small and the larger present site on How Road was acquired. With the support of the Catholic Education Office, a young parishioner had begun a playgroup at the old Galilee Church in a portable room provided for the purpose. When the present site was bought, the first building established there was this one, brought from the old Galilee church. The community room is on the same site, appropriately, and the school grew from that start as part of a holistic Catholic Community.

Stage 1 was opened in 2007, planned for a capacity of 100 students, from 5 years to 9 years. With the sale of the old Galilee church, Mass was held in the main gathering space of Stage 1. The centre was planned to include in the coming years a church and multipurpose spaces, community health and counselling facilities, opportunity shops, a preschool, community sports fields, fitness/walking tracks and community reflection and play gardens. Much of

this initial vision has been accomplished, thanks to the untiring efforts of our parishioners and professionals.

RETURNING TO GOD

Once on a beach about forty miles south-east of Brisbane I watched as a man took a crate of homing pigeons from the boot of his car. Then he opened the crate and released the pigeons. They flew straight up into the air. However, instead of heading directly for Brisbane which was their home, they proceeded to fly in circles above us. Round and round they went. To someone who didn't understand what was going on this seemed silly and a waste of time. But apparently what the pigeons were doing was finding their bearings. Once they had found their bearings they would set off for home.

This homing instinct which many birds possess is an almost miraculous thing. With some it seems to be an in-built thing. But others, such as pigeons, have to be trained. The basic requirement of training is to keep them in good health so that they are capable of sustained flight. Fog, snow, rain and adverse winds are some of the obstacles they have to overcome.

We too have a homing instinct. God has not left us rudderless. God has put a homing instinct in us. This is a very subtle and fragile thing, since God will never take away our freedom. It takes the form of an inner restlessness and discontent. This restlessness, this discontent, this longing, far from being a curse, is a blessing.

Just as the homing instinct doesn't save the birds from the necessity of having to struggle against the wind and the rain, so faith doesn't shield us from the hard knocks of life and death. But what it does is give us bearings. It enables us to live in a topsy-turvey world without getting lost or giving in to despair. It assures us that we have a home to go to, and points us in that direction.



for you, and after I have gone and prepared you a place, I shall return to take you with me; so that where I am you may be too.

You know the way to the place where I am going.'

Thomas said, 'Lord, we do not know where you are going, so how can we know the way?' Jesus said:

'I am the Way, the Truth and the Life

No one can come to the Father except through me.

If you know me, you know my Father too.

From this moment you know him and have seen him.'

Philip said, 'Lord, let us see the Father and then we shall be satisfied.' 'Have I been with you all this time, Philip,' said Jesus to him 'and you still do not know me?

'To have seen me is to have seen the Father, so how can you say, "Let us see the Father"?

Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words I say to you I do not speak as from myself: it is the Father, living in me, who is doing this work.

You must believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; believe it on the evidence of this work, if for no other reason. I tell you most solemnly, whoever believes in me will perform the same works as I do myself, he will perform even greater works, because I am going to the Father.'

EXPLORING THE WORD

Today's gospel draws our attention to the time when Jesus will depart from the disciples (the Ascension is two weeks away). When Jesus is gone, the disciples must continue the task which he has begun. One can imagine their fear and uncertainty in being left with such a monumental challenge. Philip's question, 'Lord, how can we know the way?', shows their fear clearly enough. But help is available. Jesus is the way, the truth and the life. He is both the map and the destination. Disciples are called to adopt Jesus' life-style, his approach to God, to others, to all

creation. In living as Jesus did, living the life of faith, the disciples will know the truth and will have life. This life of faith and living the way of Jesus, God's way in the world, will enable the disciples, not only to continue the work of Jesus, but to perform even greater works.
