## THE GOD OF ALL

The employees at an international publishing house specialising in encyclopedias and world data were just as one would image - culturally diverse, well-educated, bookish, and respectful of other's beliefs and social mores. For a young Irish Catholic editor it was an eye-opening experience to be working alongside Jews, Muslims, Hindus, Buddhists, Universalist Unitarians, agnostics, atheists, Catholics and Protestants of every stripe, and one self-described Northumberland Danish communist. Religion was rarely discussed, but, one day while riding in the elevator together, the Hindu librarian and Catholic editor struck up a



conversation about world events and political strife in the Middle East. "All these religious wars are so crazy," the Hindu commented. "After all, we all believe in the same God".

We do? the editor thought to herself. Well, not exactly, she concluded. But she had no intention of getting into a theological debate, and the more she thought about it, the more wisdom she uncovered in the librarian's insight. If we accept that there are truths emanating from the source of the universe, and all of us tap into these universal truths in varying ways, then, yes, we all believe in the same God - a God who defines love and who for Christians is love, in flesh and spirit from the beginning, now, and ever more.

**GOSPEL**

**John 16:12-15**

Jesus said to his disciples:

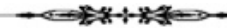
‘I still have many things to say to you but they would be too much for you now.

But when the Spirit of truth comes he will lead you to the complete truth, since he will not be speaking as from himself but will say only what he has learnt; and he will tell you of the things to come.

He will glorify me, since all he tells you will be taken from what is mine.

Everything the Father has is mine; that is why I said:

*All he tells you will be taken from what is mine.’*



**DID YOU KNOW?**

- The early Christians struggled to understand the belief that God is both one and three. Many great councils of the church were held to clarify what this meant and to find the language with which to describe the trinitarian relationship between Father, Son and Spirit. It was not until the Council of Constantinople in ad 381 that the doctrine of the Trinity was defined.
- Many of the prayers of the church express our belief in a triune God (three persons in one). One of the greatest and most simple of these prayers is the sign of the cross, in which we dedicate ourselves ‘in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit’.
- St Augustine described the Trinity in terms of the Lover, the Beloved and the Love that exists between them.
- St Patrick reportedly used the shamrock to explain the three persons in one God to the pagans of Ireland.

**SYMBOLS AND IMAGES**

Human beings will always struggle before the mystery of God, who is one but also three. Augustine’s idea of the Trinity as a communion of love is a very rich and powerful image. Can

our own communion of love with others teach us something of the life and love of the Trinity?

**EXPLORING THE WORD**

The people of Israel were unique among the nations of the ancient world in that they held to a belief in one God. But Jesus speaks of this God as ‘Abba’, Father. There is an implied relationship with this God. Jesus also speaks of the Spirit, and again, there is a relationship implied between Jesus and the Spirit, for this Spirit will continue to speak the words of God and of Jesus and will glorify them. Thus begins the early church’s deep reflection on the mystery of Jesus and the relationship between Father, Son and Spirit. This relationship was ultimately formulated in what we now call the Trinity.

In this text, Jesus is addressing all those who will search for the truth down the centuries to come. All of us are led to complete truth and understanding through the actions of the Spirit, who directs us to the Father and the Son: *‘At the heart of the mystery of the Trinity is a Father whose love is incarnated in the Son who gives life to the world, and in the mutual love which exists between the Father and the Son and touches our lives as the Holy Spirit’* F. Maloney
