WORLD ENVIRONMENT DAY

Each day at Galilee School we experience a generous and loving community. The children are aware of this and they often look for ways to reach out to others here at school and beyond. This year for World Environment Day on Friday June 5 we donated 200 native indigenous plants to the Catholic Parish of Kangaroo Island to replace those lost during the January bushfires. We hope these shrubs, grasses and plants create habitats for butterflies, birds and native creatures and enhance and regenerate Kangaroo Islands native habitat.

PYJAMA DAY

On Friday 12 June Galilee Catholic School held a pyjama day. Children and staff wore pyjamas to school for the day for a gold coin donation and raised \$425 for St Vincent De Paul society. EASING OF RESTRICTIONS

(From next week) Places of Worship and Funerals will be permitted for up to 75 attendees subject to the 4 square metre rule. (Next week with the 4m² rule applied, Willunga can seat 37, Aldinga 22 and Normanville 15.)

Limited Masses will be held at all three of our communities this week. The rules about social distancing, hand hygiene and a sign-in sheet to record names (given and surname) and phone numbers, will be in place. It is a requirement that the doors be shut once the stipulated number of people are inside.

For this week, the maximum number of people permitted at St Peter's, Normanville is 15 (plus celebrant). Mary of Galilee, Aldinga and St Joseph's, Willunga may have up to 20 attendees (plus celebrant).

The Archdiocese recommends that those who are at higher risk from Covid-19 should be encouraged to stay home, but also reassures everyone that the obligation for Sunday Mass for the laity has not been re-invoked at this stage.

GALILEE OP SHOP and CIRCLE OF FRIENDS

Given the vulnerable ages of most volunteers, the Op Shop Management Team and Fr Josy, agreed to postpone reopening until after the Winter School holidays. This will allow more clarity about Covid-19 regulations for businesses like Op Shops and take us past the cold and flu season. However, donations on hand have been used.

Team members responded to an urgent call on the Aldinga and Surrounds Community Forum for warm clothes and beanies. These were taken to Aboriginal people discharged from hospital in Alice Springs and spending two weeks quarantined in an Adelaide Hills Hostel, before returning to their various communities. They were very cold.



As well, blankets and warm clothing were gathered for three refugee families, including seven children and teenagers, plus six individuals who had sought help from Circle of Friends 110 – the Rapid Response Circle. With no income and unable to find work, their situations were bleak. https://cofa.org.au/

What couldn't be found in the Op Shop or from friends, was purchased using money donated to the Circle. This also paid for rent, utility bills, medical costs, heaters, store vouchers for shoes, personal items and additional warm clothing. Another two Circles deliver food hampers each week, bulk buying and sharing fruit and vegetables donated by market gardeners. Challenging times on many levels.

HOLY FATHER'S APPEAL (Peter's Pence)

The Pope has moved the date of the Peter's Pence Collection to October 4, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

The Director of the Holy See Press Office, Matteo Bruni, announced that: "Considering the current health emergency, the Holy Father has established that, for the current year 2020, the Peter's Pence collection, which traditionally takes place around the solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul on June 29, will be transferred throughout the world to the 27th Sunday of Ordinary Time, October 4, memorial of Saint Francis of Assisi." Cathedral Mass times will return to normal from this weekend (with a maximum of 75 people allowed). The Archdiocese will continue to live stream Sunday Mass at 11.00am (note the change from 10.00am). This Mass can be viewed live and on demand at www.adelaide.catholic.org.au.

For those without internet access the Sunday Mass is replayed on Channel 44 at 4pm every week. An interstate service is screened live every week on Channel 10 at 6am.

COURAGEOUS LOVE

Sister Dorothy Stang, a Sister of Notre Dame de Namur, was murdered in 2005 by a pair of gunmen as she walked along a rural road in Brazil's Amazon region. Stang had been receiving death threats for years because of her work on land reform, peasants' rights, and environmental issues and had asked the government on a number of occasions for better protection for the people in this isolated area, whom loggers and large landowners wanted elsewhere.

A witness to the shooting said that when her assailants approached, Dorothy said, "You men are armed. I



am not. The only defence I carry is the word of God". She pulled out a Bible and began to read to them. Her killers listened for a moment, took a few steps back, and fired.

There is no doubt Sister Dorothy followed Jesus' command to fear no one. She is now surely being acknowledged before God. But what I find most unbelievable is that the gunmen actually paused to listen to Sister Dorothy read from the Bible. What could possibly have been going through their minds as she read?

Perhaps Sister Dorothy's steadfast witness even unto death had an impact on these hardened hearts, and they may someday find the courage to seek forgiveness. In the meantime, I pray that we all might find the courage to love so courageously.

SEAFARERS DO KEY WORK



The coronavirus pandemic has made many of us rethink the nature of an essential worker. We have a new appreciation of those who do so much work, often for little reward. This theme is picked up in the Day of Seafarer (25 June) campaign which calls on us to acknowledge seafarers are key workers.

At first sight the Day of the Seafarer might strike us as a celebration left over from the distant past. It awakens nostalgia. It recalls times when crossing the seas was a long and lonely business that cut off sailors from contact with the land, separated them from family for a year or more, and made every homecoming a source of joy and relief for them.

RISKS REMAIN Today ships are larger, stronger and constantly in contact with other ships and the shore. Sailors are much less at risk of being lost at sea. But the lives of people who work on ships remain challenging. During the Coronavirus shutdowns attention focused on passengers on cruise ships, whose holiday of a lifetime turned into an experience of captivity. The staff members who cared for their needs and desires on board, ranging from the ship's crew, to the support staff, the cooks and kitchen staff, the cleaners and launderers, musicians and entertainers and other employees, received much less attention. It was estimated that some 100,000 people were trapped on cruise ships during the crisis as port after port refused them permission to land.

Crew members often work under harsh conditions. Ships, owned by wealthy first world corporations, are often registered under flags of convenience in developing nations that free the investors from paying award wages and from obligations to keep their employees safe and guarantee their employment.

CULTURE OF INEQUALITY Crew members on fishing vessels in many parts of the world are badly paid and fed, bullied and risk being beaten or even killed if they complain. They are caught in a culture of greed and inequality, in which people are disrespected for their humanity, but used and abused for their profitability. The most publicised images of exploitation are the small, unseaworthy and grossly overloaded boats on which people seeking protection from persecution and hunger go into debt to purchase a seat, often only later to sink and be drowned.

The crew are often vilified as exploiters of misery. But they, too, are often poor and are driven by ruthless business people to risk their own lives as well as those of their passengers in order to support their families.


One of the traditional services of churches to sailors and members of the crew has been to accompany them on board ships and to provide a meeting place for them while they are on shore. Some cruise ships carry chaplains for the passengers, their services are also appreciated by members of the crew who often come from nations with a rich Christian culture. The daily Eucharist that they offer is received as a precious gift.

WHISPERED WORD

Jesus says to fear no one; but I run out of fingers counting the people and situations that cause fear and anxiety in my life. I want to believe with the certainty of Paul, but more often I find myself keeping company with Jeremiah, worried to a frazzle. Is it that I doubt God is going to get me out of the latest scrape I'm in? (Yes) Is it that God has given me reason to doubt that I will be rescued? (No) So what's the problem?

The problem is me, not God. God keeps track of the hairs on my head and the fate of every sparrow, but I'm keeping the log of everything that can and does go wrong with frail mortality. People go broke. People get sick. People die. These things are often more compelling to me than God's dominion over creation. Jesus reminds us that the body is not as important as the soul, but I have grown very fond of the body and have spent a lifetime preserving it. Still, I crawl up on the rooftop of hope every once in a while and warble faintly about what I've heard and believe, despite all uncertainty, to be



true. When I speak this truth, its certainty grows in me. When I act on this truth, I'm brought into the light. *GPBS eNews*

PFC met last Friday in The Shed at Willunga (with the $4m^2$ rule in place, we were permitted up to 12 people).

The Council hadn't met for some time and there was a busy agenda. The main topics were the Chapel Street land and finding a replacement for Sue Summers, who has been filling in as Finance Officer since last July.

We very much appreciate the work that Tony Harding has been doing, constantly monitoring the progress through Onkaparinga Council of an application to subdivide the land on Chapel Street. After receiving advice and input from a land agent, surveyors, hydrologist, town planner and Council officers, our application is progressing well. It is just 12 months since the process began.

- 3. Periodic regular payments may also be organised with your bank. Take the account details (above) with you and bank staff can set it up for you.

COMPLIANCE WITH REGULATIONS

(The following conditions apply from Friday June 19)

- Attendance for mass is permitted for up to 75 attendees (whilst maintaining the 4 square metre rule)
- This number also applies for funerals and weddings.
- Except for families and household groups, people should be at least 1.5 metres apart.
- There should be no physical contact outside one's family or household group.
- There should be no shaking of hands or holding hands during the Mass.
- Every gathering must record contact details. Logs are located at the entrance to the Church.
- Hand sanitizer is to be available at church entrances.
- Precious Blood will not be distributed.
- No collection plates or hymn books are to be passed around.
- Communion is given only in hands.
- Holy Water is not available at the doors of churches.
- All surfaces should be cleaned at least daily, with special attention given to frequently touched surfaces.
- Sick and high risk/vulnerable people should be encouraged not to attend.
- Collection plates will not be passed around but a single drop point is provided at the churches.
- Offertory procession will be omitted.
- Care should be taking at the dismissal and on leaving the church to minimise social contact.
- The obligation for Sunday Mass for the laity HAS NOT BEEN RE-INVOKED at this stage.



GOSPEL Matthew 10:26-33

Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows: 'Do not be afraid. For everything that is now covered will be uncovered, and everything now hidden will be made clear. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the daylight; what you hear in whispers, proclaim from the housetops.

'Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; fear him rather who can destroy both body and soul in hell. Can you not buy two sparrows for a penny? And yet not one falls to the ground without your Father knowing. Why, every hair on your head has been counted. So there is no need to be afraid; you are worth more than hundreds of sparrows.

'So if anyone declares himself for me in the presence of men, I will declare myself for him in the presence of my Father in heaven. But the one who disowns me in the presence of men, I will disown in the presence of my Father in heaven.'



DID YOU KNOW?

- Sparrows were sold in market places as inexpensive food for the poor and were a symbol of something of minimal value.
- Members of the church who have died rather than renounce their faith are called martyrs. The word martyr literally means 'witness'. Throughout history, many have given their lives for the faith, and in our own time, people are still martyred because they will not swerve from their commitment to Christ.
- By the time Matthew wrote his gospel, the church was already undergoing persecution in some areas, and Christian faith was being sorely tested.

EXPLORING THE WORD

The people of Matthew's community were being persecuted for their faith. They were mostly Jews who had come to accept Jesus as the awaited Messiah. But not all Jews accepted this, and they did not want the Christians to worship with them in the synagogues, so the Jewish Christians were expelled. Matthew's Christian community was feeling very vulnerable and trying to find a new way of living their faith outside the traditional Jewish practices. In this passage, Matthew comforts them and assures them that they need not fear physical harm, for God knows every hair of their heads and will protect them. Those who are strong in their faith and refuse to recant will be honoured before God. If God extends his care to the sparrows, the cheapest life available, how much more will he extend his care to his faithful people?

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

Jesus' words in this text are words of encouragement for the confused and fearful Christians of that time and all times. He speaks of a time when his teachings will be shouted from the rooftops and clear to all. Jesus reassures believers that their faith will be rewarded. They are precious to him and to the Father.
