John 11:1-45 (abridged)

There was a man named Lazarus who lived in the village of Bethany with two sisters, Mary and Martha, and he was ill. It was the same Marv, the sister of the sick man Lazarus, who anointed the Lord with ointment and wiped his feet with her hair. The sisters sent this message to Jesus, 'Lord, the man you love is ill.' On receiving the message, Jesus said, 'This sickness will end not in death but in God's glory, and through it the Son of God will be glorified.

Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, yet when he heard that Lazarus was ill he stayed where he was for two more days before saying to the disciples, 'Let us go to Judaea.'

On arriving, Jesus found that Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days already.

The 2023 Marian Procession will be held on Sunday May 21 beginning at the Pioneer Women's Memorial Gardens (next to the Torrens Parade



#### **EACH PERSON IS UNIQUELY** PRECIOUS AND DESERVING OF RESPECT

In recent years we have become much more sensitive to the extent of discrimination in our society. We have come to see more clearly how easily we can take it for granted and fail to notice it. People who are discriminated against have found a voice and called us out when we tolerate wounding and scornful ways of speaking and behaving.

Celebration of the Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (21 March) may seem more urgent now after the protests of the Black Lives Matter movement against police discrimination and the routine killings of Black citizens in the United States. Followed by similar movements in Australia, they showed how common and routine are racist attitudes. More



recently other groups of people have protested against the discrimination and brutal treatment of people who are homosexual or have changed gender. They have also allowed us to see from inside how hurtful and debilitating discrimination is.

Racial discrimination is unjustifiable because it is built on a shallow and dangerous understanding of what it means to be human. It assumes that the most important and defining quality of people is their race. From that belief follows the conclusion that race controls the way in which people should be treated. In reality, although racial identity is an important aspect of human lives, each person is uniquely precious simply because they are human. Because we share a common humanity we are all are entitled to an equal respect. We should not privilege one group over others on the grounds of race, wealth, gender religion or political allegiances.

In Australia many people complain of meeting different kinds of prejudice and discrimination in their daily lives. Some are abused and discriminated against on the grounds of their race, others on the grounds of their religion, their political views or their gender.

In any society discrimination against minority groups in society displays a lack of respect for the humanity of the people who are discriminated against. Societies often need laws against racial, and other forms of, discrimination. But such laws cannot create respect. Respect is the business of the whole community. That is why we have a World Day to remind us of this call.

### I WILL OPEN YOUR GRAVES (John 11: 1 - 45)

How we long to hear these words of Jesus when those we love become ill: "This sickness is not fatal". How we want to believe our loved ones will not leave us, and how betrayed we feel when our loving arms are not enough to hold them in life. Human life is a passing shadow. We're not called mortal for nothing.

So what are we to make of this story of Lazarus? He's not saved from death in the long run; Lazarus will surely die again. But Jesus demonstrates graphically what it means to be the Lord of life. The Son of Man has power over death. No one passes beyond the limits of his kingdom. None of us is lost to life by moving beyond its tangible boundaries. Even the dead respond to the sound of Christ's voice. The shepherd knows his sheep, and they know him. The gift of Christianity is this assurance in the continuance of life, its fulfillment and transfiguration beyond mortality. Our loved ones are not lost. (Current from 23/03/23)




- If you have tested positive for COVID-19 please stay home and do not attend church services until you have fully recovered.

#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

- Mary, Martha and Lazarus, named as special friends of Jesus, lived in Bethany, a small town on the outskirts of Jerusalem, just over the Mount of Olives.
- Popular Jewish belief was that the soul hovered near the body for three days after death. The 'fourth day' indicates that Lazarus is well and truly passed away, thus making his resuscitation even more amazing.
- The Pharisees believed in the resurrection of the dead at the end of time but the Sadducees did not.

When Martha heard that Jesus had come she went to meet him. Mary remained sitting in the house. Martha said to Jesus, 'If you had been here, my brother would not have died, but I know that, even now, whatever you ask of God, he will grant you.' 'Your brother' said Jesus to her 'will rise again.' Martha said, 'I know he will rise again at the resurrection on the last day.' Jesus said:

'I am the resurrection and the life. If anyone believes in me, even though he dies he will live, and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?'


'Yes, Lord,' she said 'I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who was to come into this world.'

Jesus said in great distress, with a sigh that came straight from the heart, 'Where have you put him?' They said, 'Lord, come and see.' Jesus wept; and the Jews said, 'See how much he loved him!' But there were some who remarked. 'He opened the eves of the blind man, could he not have prevented this man's death?' Still sighing, Jesus reached the tomb: it was a cave with a stone to close the opening. Jesus said, 'Take the stone away.' Martha said to him, 'Lord, by now he will smell; this is the fourth day.' Jesus replied, 'Have I not told you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?' So they took away the stone. Then Jesus lifted up his eves and said:

'Father, I thank you for hearing my prayer. I knew indeed that you always hear me, but I speak for the sake of all these who stand round me, so that they may believe it was you who sent me.'

When he had said this, he cried in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, here! Come out!' The dead man came out, his feet and hands bound with bands of stuff and a cloth round his face. Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, let him go free '

Many of the Jews who had come to visit Mary and had seen what he did believed in him.



#### **DEATH NO LONGER PROUD**

A mother came up to me with her second-grade son at her side. She told me he had something he wanted to ask me. He held on to her hand tightly. The words clearly difficult for him to formulate. After some squirming and hesitating, he finally asked me if he could bury his deceased pet dog in the soil on the side of the church. I assured him that I could think of no more fitting a resting place for his pet to be buried. He was very relieved.

Among all the other benefits and good reasons for a child caring for a pet is that they often do teach a lesson in the reality of death. In our society, death seldom is experienced at home. We try to make it more palatable with wakes and memorial services. But it remains an unknown reality for many of us. And we tend to fear what we do not know. Witness how often the word death is used in titles of movies or books created to frighten us.

Death was much more visible in Jesus' time. Warm climates meant the necessity for quick burials. There is a finality about it. That is, until Jesus comes and rolls back the stone and calls his friend Lazarus out. After that moment, we realise death will never have the same hold over us.
