FIRST READING

Amos 8:4-7

Listen to this, you who trample on the needy and try to suppress the poor people of the country, you who say, 'When will New Moon be over so that we can sell our corn, and sabbath, so that we can market our wheat?

Then by lowering the bushel, raising the shekel, by swindling and tampering with the scales, we can buy up the poor for money, and the needy for a pair of sandals, and get a price even for the sweeping of the wheat.'

The Lord swears it by the pride of Jacob, 'Never will I forget a single thing you have done.'

SECOND READING

1 Timothy 2:1-8

My advice is that, first of all, there should be prayers offered for everyone – petitions, intercessions and thanksgiving – and especially for kings and others in authority, so that we may be able to live religious and reverent lives in peace and quiet. To do this is right, and will please God our saviour: he wants everyone to be

saved and reach full knowledge of the truth. For there is only one God, and there is only one mediator between God and humankind, himself a man, Christ Jesus, who sacrificed himself as a ransom for them all. He is the evidence of this, sent at the appointed time, and I have been named a herald and apostle of it and – I am telling the truth and no lie – a teacher of the faith and the truth to the pagans.

In every place, then, I want the men to lift their hands up reverently in prayer, with no anger or argument.

CAN WE BE TRUSTED?

A red-spined book sat on the shelf of my parents' home while I was growing up. It was titled: "You Can Trust Communists". Believe me, my parents were not subversive characters by any means, so this title tended to startle the casual browser. Should you pick up this book and look at the face on it, however, you would see the subtitle: ("To Be Communists"). I admit I never read the book, but the deceptive title reminds me of the parable of the unjust steward. Is Jesus praising the actions of the steward, as the master in the story does? Are we to presume 'the ends justify the means' in Jesus' evaluation? Of course not. Jesus is saving you can trust the unjust steward (to be unjust). And to be good at it. This guy is a

Can you trust Christians, to be Christians? Not always. We don't live up to our name every time. We aren't "professionals" about our faith, skilled and dedicated, fully identified with our vocation. Many of us are hobbyists, at best, playing at Christianity in our spare time, when it doesn't get in the way. Jesus asks for more.

Consider the gifts that God has entrusted to you. How trustworthy are you? Integrity is like losing weight: simple, but easy. Make a list of things in your life that fit together with your commitment to bear the name of Christ. List the things that do not fit, and think of steps you can take to bring your life in line. EQUAL PAY FOR WORK OF EQUAL VALUE

International Equal Pay Day, celebrated on 18 September, represents the longstanding efforts towards the achievement of equal pay for work of equal value. It further builds on the United Nations' commitment to human rights and against all forms of discrimination, including discrimination against women and girls.

Across all regions, women are paid less than men, with the gender pay gap estimated at around 20 per cent globally. Gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls continue to be held back owing to the persistence of historical and structural

unequal power relations between women and men, poverty and inequalities and disadvantages in access to resources and opportunities that limit women's and girls' capabilities. Progress on narrowing that gap has been slow. While equal pay for men and women has been widely endorsed, applying it in practice has been difficult.

COMPLIANCE WITH COVID-19 REGULATIONS

(Current from 15/09/22)



- If you have tested positive for COVID-19 please follow the instructions as per SA Health in terms of contact tracing and isolating yourself as per government health protocols. Please stay home and do not attend church services until you have fully recovered.
- The density requirement has been updated to full capacity in all churches and also includes funerals and weddings.
- Wearing of face-masks in Church is strongly recommended by the Archbishop.
- Sick and high risk/vulnerable people are requested to stay home and not attend services.
- Hand sanitiser is available at church entrances.
- Communion is given only in hands. Precious Blood will not be distributed.
- Holy Water is not available at the doors of churches.
- Procession of gifts has resumed.
- Collection plates are to be passed around with minimum contact

- In Jesus' time, wealth was seen as reward for virtue so these words were a great challenge.



Then the steward said to himself,
"Now that my master is taking the stewardship from me, what am I to do? Dig? I am not strong enough. Go begging? I should be too ashamed.
Ah, I know what I will do to make sure that when I am dismissed from office there will be some to welcome me into their homes."

Then he called his master's debtors one by one. To the first he said, "How much do you owe my master?" "One hundred measures of oil" was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond; sit down straight away and write fifty." To another he said, "And you, sir, how much do you owe?" "One hundred measures of wheat" was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond and write eighty."

'The master praised the dishonest steward for his astuteness. For the children of this world are more astute in dealing with their own kind than are the children of light.

'And so I tell you this: use money, tainted as it is, to win you friends, and thus make sure that when it fails you, they will welcome you into the tents of eternity. The man who can be trusted in little things can be trusted in great; the man who is dishonest in little things will be dishonest in great. If then you cannot be trusted with money, that tainted thing, who will trust you with genuine riches? And if you cannot be trusted with what is not yours, who will give you what is your very own?

'No servant can be the slave of two masters: he will either hate the first and love the second, or treat the first with respect and the second with scorn. You cannot be the slave both of God and of money.'



WASTE NOT

Every once in a while, I am aware that I spend more money than I should on things that I really do not need. The most recent example, but not the only one, occurred not long ago when in Melbourne for three weeks, waiting for the birth of a second grandchild. I did laundry for my daughter and her family. I took the living room rug to the laundromat to be washed. I wrote letters. I read a 600-page biography of

Patsy Jefferson, daughter of Thomas. And I shopped - for things I did not need

This was the most recent instance, but when these once-in-a-while urges occur, I buy clothes I do not need. I eat out more because it's easier, and I shop online for books rather then find them at the nearby library. I don't economise when grocery shopping but rather buy every conceivable delectable treat that meets my eye, no matter the price.

When I spend with such abandon, I ignore the little voice within that says I should be more responsible about using my resources. The bills will come, and the money is there, but this persistent voice of conscience asks: "Is this how I am to use the treasure that has been entrusted to my care?" In my heart of hearts, I know that it is not. We've been put on notice by the gospels not to squander what has been entrusted to us.

Faithful in everything, you call us, O God, to use our own resources compassionately and justly.
